Schools Camps

Reading

Why does my child struggle with reading?

Unlike speaking, reading does not come naturally. It is hard! For some children and even adults, reading is something that has to be actively worked on, but it doesn't necessarily mean there is a serious problem that can't be overcome. There are lots of reasons why your child might struggle with reading and there are things you can do at home to help.

Reading frequently with your child will help you identify what parts of reading they are struggling with. Are they struggling to remember what the sounds are? Are they able to easily blend the sounds together to make words? Do they struggle to comprehend what they are reading? Maybe they don't know the meaning of words. Once you are aware of which part of reading they are having trouble with, you can then help your child to overcome the struggle.

Give your children a range of reading experiences. The school and town library provide so many quality reading books and don't cost anything! The internet can also be a great source of reading material. Finding something to read that engages your children will help motivate them to practise! Maybe they love learning about animal facts, or Ancient Egypt. Maybe they love fantasy stories, or friendship stories. Explore books with your children, talk about texts and help them find things that they love to read about.

Having your child's hearing and vision regularly can help identify early issues, and these 2 factors have a huge impact on a child's ability to learn to read. Even temporary moderate hearing loss can have a significant negative impact on a child's ability to learn to read.

Talk to you child's teacher about how they are progressing in their reading, especially if you are having some concerns.
